Biology major, Maya Adair, has been accepted to the "Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences Neuroscience Summer Undergraduate Research Program at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston". This is a 10 week long, paid REU where students conduct research and learn about the following topics:

Biomedical neuroscience research skills related to cell and molecular biology, translational sciences, toxicology, infectious disease research, stem cells, and tissue engineering! I will also become familiar with techniques like cell culturing, isolation of stem cells, immunoassays, animal surgery, mass spectroscopy, and electrophysiology.

Maya applied to 14 programs total, all over the U.S., and is still waiting to hear back from others!

Biology major, Chris Winski, was accepted to the 2018 Microbiology Summer Undergraduate Research Program (MicroSURP) at UT Health - Houston, which includes a \$4,500 stipend. Chris won one of only eight spots out of over 200 applicants. The program runs ten weeks, from Monday, May 21st to Friday, July 27th.

Doctors Without Borders-A Voice from the Field

Tuesday, March 6, 2018; UTHSCA Pestana Lecture Hall (7703 Floyd Curl Dr; SA, TX)

"A Voice from the Field" is a personal look at the profession of humanitarian aid, through the lens of one field nurse working alongside Doctors Without Borders / Medecins Sans Frontieres (MSF). Anna Freeman will describe her field work from the past ten years as she reflects and shares a myriad of personal experiences that culminate into a life journey of providing relief to the sick and downtrodden around the world. From working with victims of trauma and measles outbreak in the eastern Congo to responding to Ebola in Liberia, Anna's insights on her experience will help to illustrate the complexity of humanitarian crises around the world.
