A Letter from Vice President of Mission and Ministry, Sr. Walter Maher, CCVI

Christmas: The Womb to the Tomb



Dear University Community,

I invite you to take a careful look at this icon representing the birth of our beloved Incarnate Word.

Note three things about this depiction of our Lord's birthday.

- *First*, the "manger" is a small rock-hewn cave that mirrors Jesus' tomb.
- Second, the cradle is a stone box, that is, a coffin.
- Third, baby Jesus is wrapped in linens, almost like a mummy.

What is going on here?

Obviously, this is not some sick, macabre joke. Instead, it is an invitation to remember that the Son of God, the Incarnate Word, came into the world to save humanity, that is, to die for us so as to bring us back to God, the Father. A different way to think about this is by pondering about and praying with this old dictum: "A virgin womb, conceiving thee, revealed thee; a virgin tomb, receiving thee, concealed thee."

Once we have established the deep meaning of this icon, we can now go back to the better known elements of it, expressly, Mary and Joseph, the angels, the shepherds, the magi - and yes, of course, the sheep and the donkey and the cow... all are there.



However, every single one of them looks serious, somber, pensive. It is as if every single one of them understands that this baby has come to fulfill an incredible promise and that his presence will change everything for everyone. So they are experiencing a mixture of joy and sadness; anticipation and trepidation; fear and resolve.

How about us? Are we supposed to celebrate Christmas with gloom and doom? Of course not! However, before we move too quickly into gift-exchanging, drinking, eating, and dancing, let us pause, ponder, and pray for at least a little while about the wondrous event we are celebrating:

- Our all omniscient, omnipotent, omnipresent God has become like one of us. Look at Him! He is now a baby who is vulnerable, dependent, frail.
- His reason for being here, among us, is to show us how much God loves all of us and how far God is willing to go to get us all back.
- The price He is willing to pay for his decision will be a horrific death at the hands of those who felt threatened by his message of love and justice.
- Our reward our real Christmas gift is that, through Him, we are now sons and daughters of God the Father; brothers and sisters in Christ, through the Holy Spirit. (Continued on p. 3)




A different way to express all this can be found in the words written by a 15th century English Jesuit and Martyr named St. Robert Southwell. He wrote:

As I in hoary winter's night stood shivering in the snow, Surpris'd I was with sudden heat which made my heart to glow; And lifting up a fearful eye to view what fire was near, A pretty Babe all burning bright did in the air appear; Who, scorched with excessive heat, such floods of tears did shed As though his floods should quench his flames which with his tears were fed. "Alas!" quoth he, "but newly born, in fiery heats I fry, Yet none approach to warm their hearts or feel my fire but I! My faultless breast the furnace is, the fuel wounding thorns, Love is the fire, and sighs the smoke, the ashes shame and scorns; The fuel Justice layeth on, and Mercy blows the coals, The metal in this furnace wrought are men's defiled souls, For which, as now on fire I am to work them to their good, So will I melt into a bath to wash them in my blood." With this he vanish'd out of sight and swiftly shrunk away,

And straight I called unto mind that it was Christmas day.

Christmas brings us a Savior, a loving God-with-us, a servant Messiah. It doesn't get any better than that! So, let us rejoice and be glad. Let us receive Him with joy, and love, and true adoration. And let us make sure to commit to be the kind of people who honor Him by living lives worthy of his sacrifice.


